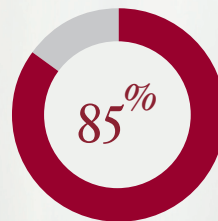

- Develop a statewide network of up to six interdisciplinary primary care teaching clinics
- Expand education and training programs to address workforce shortages in dentistry, mental health, and geriatrics
- Encourage students from underrepresented communities to pursue health professional careers
- Increase scholarships and programs for students who choose to provide care in underserved communities
- Create a Minnesota Electronic Health Library

- A diverse and more robust health professional workforce
- Access to comprehensive clinical care information and resources for all Minnesotans
